

At the Albert Einstein College of Medicine, one of our missions is to provide our students with opportunities to foster meaningful connections and collaboration with the Bronx community. Einstein's longitudinal Service-Learning Course was developed in 2022 in alignment with this mission. In this course, students will learn about the needs and strengths of the Bronx and other local communities by pairing active community service with critical reflection and a dedicated curriculum imparting the knowledge, skills, and attitudes needed for successful community engagement.

Students will:

- 1. partner with community-based organizations (CBOs) to engage in meaningful service that meets the community's identified needs and has reciprocal benefits to the student and the community served.
- 2. have structured time to prepare for, reflect on, and connect the service experience to professional competencies such as cultural humility, professionalism, inter- and intra-professional communication, teamwork, and social responsibility.
- **3.** have opportunities to interweave service-learning with other educational and clinical experiences across the medical school curriculum to learn about and address social determinants of health in order to provide patient-centered care with cultural humility.



To achieve these goals, students will partner with a community-based organization in one of <u>12 focus areas</u> to <u>complete 40 hours of service over the course of one year</u>. The focus areas and service-learning sites are described in the following pages:

Advocacy & Community Health Promotion

Montefiore Office of Community & Population Health

Dedicated to advancing the health of the entire community, the Montefiore Office of Community and Population Health (MOCPH) works in partnership with community organizations to assess needs and resources and develop and implement innovative programs that address critical health issues faced by Bronx residents. Einstein students will develop and lead a workshop series on a variety of health topics with Bronx community groups and contribute to the community engagement plan for the 2025-2027 Bronx-wide Community Health Needs Assessment. Students will also assist the MOCPH team with survey collection in the Bronx.

Bronx Oncology Living Daily (BOLD) Cancer Wellness Program

BOLD is a wellness and support program open to anyone affected by cancer, including Montefiore Einstein Cancer Center patients, family caregivers and members of the cancer care community. Einstein students will provide health education and wellness workshops, conduct clinical outreach in the Bronx community around cancer screenings, perform quality of life assessments with Bronx cancer patients, participate in cultural and identity-based cancer outreach task forces, and engage in other activities involving cancer patient support and cancer outreach in the community.

Bronx Community Board 9

Bronx Community Board 9 serves the communities of Bronx River, Castle Hill, Clason Point, Harding Park, Parkchester, Park Stratton, Soundview / Bruckner, & Unionport. Bronx Community Board 9's mission is to create family friendly neighborhoods for all. Einstein students will attend community board meetings and events, collect and learn about city-wide and local resources available to our communities, engage in health-related projects that serve our residents, and engage seniors in community activities, share important information with them, and help seniors stay connected to current and future events to encourage their input and participation.

Homelessness & Harm Reduction

Boom! Health Harm Reduction Center (Argus Community Inc)

The Harm Reduction Center provides participants who are injecting drug users with sterile syringes and other harm reduction supplies at its drop-in center and through Peer delivery syringe exchange. Support services include low-threshold counseling services, crisis intervention, HIV/HCV testing and linkage to care. The Drop-in Center also provides daily support and education groups (including LGBT support groups), care coordination services, wound care, acupuncture and complementary therapies. Einstein students will participate in health education and other harm reduction efforts.

Breaking Ground

Breaking Ground's mission is to strengthen individuals, families, and communities by developing and sustaining exceptional supportive and affordable housing as well as programs for homeless and other vulnerable New Yorkers. In partnership with Breaking Ground staff, Einstein students will primarily develop and deliver health education/promotion presentations (in small group format) on topics of relevance for our population and may also participate in a range of ongoing programming at our residences including various tenant activities, workshops, events, etc. Additional experiential learning opportunities are also possible based on interest and availability.

BronxWorks/The Living Room Drop-In Center

The Living Room is one of the only 24-hour drop-in centers in the Bronx for street homeless adults. Clients are welcome to spend time off the street, use the laundry and showers, eat a hot meal, and get other essential help. The Living Room is a long-time partner of the student-run Homeless Outreach Project at Einstein (HOPE) group, which seeks to provide educational and health resources to the homeless and high-risk populations of the Bronx. Einstein students will provide health education, facilitate enrichment activities, and participate in stress reduction and harm reduction interventions.

Homelessness & Harm Reduction

Department of Homelessness Services-Harm Reduction Training Team

The NYC Department of Homeless Services (DHS) is a social service organization providing temporary shelter to over 100,000 households annually in over 400 shelters. People experiencing homelessness experience significant health disparities and face numerous challenges access and engaging in care and prevention services. DHS is developing a CME/CNE accredited "Harm Reduction Training for Homeless Health Care Provider" training series to build capacity of DHS affiliated medical providers to provide care to clients in shelter. Einstein students will work with DHS administration to develop training content alongside leaders in the field of medical education and harm reduction care, as well as plan, implement and evaluate the training series project.

Human Rights & Access to Care

Einstein Community Health Outreach (ECHO) Free Clinic

The ECHO Free Clinic in the Bronx, New York City, offers free, high-quality healthcare to uninsured residents. Einstein students on the pre-clinical board use ECHO as a service-learning site, managing daily operations like patient intake, appointment scheduling, and supply oversight. With 16 positions and 24 seats, they ensure smooth clinic functions. Pre-clinical board members collaborate with the clinical board and medical directors through regular meetings and strategic planning. This hands-on experience enhances students' leadership, teamwork, and healthcare delivery skills, preparing them to become compassionate and competent healthcare professionals.

ECHO Pre-Clinical Board Coordinators

Community Education Coordinator (1) Coordinates tutoring and health education programs for the community, ensuring adequate training for volunteers. Manages outreach events and health lessons, enhancing educational support for local schools.

Front-Back Desk Coordinator (2) Oversees clinic scheduling, patient registration, and data entry, ensuring smooth clinic operations. Trains and supervises Front and Back Desk volunteers, addressing any procedural concerns.

Interpreter Coordinator (1) Recruits, manages, and trains Spanish interpreters, ensuring effective communication between patients and clinic staff. Coordinates translation of clinic documents and supports cross-cultural patient care initiatives.

Labs Coordinator (3) Manages lab operations, including stocking materials and tracking lab requisitions and results. Oversees the training of lab volunteers and ensures accurate input of lab data. Patient Advocate Coordinator (2) Organizes health education and advocacy training sessions for patient advocate volunteers. Maintains patient advocate schedules and ensures volunteers are well-prepared to counsel patients.

Pre-Health Program & Scheduling Coordinator (2) Manages clinic schedules and the pre-health summer volunteer program, including application processing and training.

Public Health Coordinator (1) Manages volunteers for weekday call nights and vaccinations tracking. Coordinates public health efforts to help patients achieve long-term health goals.

Quality Improvement/Research Coordinator (1)

Develops and implements initiatives to improve clinic functioning, supporting various research projects. Facilitates the creation of abstracts and poster presentations for conferences.

Referrals Coordinator (3) Ensures patients obtain necessary specialist consultations and tracks appointments and results. Trains referral volunteers and maintains communication with medical providers.

Reproductive Health Coordinator (1) Oversees reproductive health services and supplies, ensuring availability and proper management. Trains reproductive health volunteers and integrates services within the clinic workflow.

Weekly Coordinator (2) Prepares for patient visits by reviewing charts and anticipating potential clinic day issues. Leads projects to improve patient care and coordinates volunteer training.

ECHO Project Director (1)

The Project Director oversees the Pre-Clinical Board, serving as the liaison between the Clinic Board, Medical Directors, and external organizations. Responsibilities include recruiting volunteers, organizing board meetings, collaborating with Weekly Coordinators for patient care, supporting fundraising with the Development Officer, managing public relations with the Communications Officer, and contributing to the Annual Report with the Quality Improvement Coordinator.

ECHO Pre-Clinical Board Officers

Communications Officer (1) Oversees public relations and manages ECHO's social media platforms, ensuring effective communication with the community. Organizes the annual ECHO Gala and maintains relationships with alumni and community partners.

Development Officer (1) Leads fundraising efforts and organizes events to promote ECHO within the Einstein community.

Coordinates volunteer activities and public relations to enhance volunteer morale and clinic visibility.

Finance Officer (1) Manages the clinic's budget, oversees financial planning, and ensures timely reimbursements. Works closely with the Office of Medical Education to maintain the ECHO bank account and financial records.

Outreach Officer (1) Builds and maintains relationships with community organizations to increase patient flow into ECHO. Conducts outreach efforts, including hosting educational events and tabling at community fairs.

Einstein Human Rights Clinic

The Einstein Human Rights Clinic (EHRC) is a student-led organization established in 2023 by Einstein students and Dr. Carolina Miranda in partnership with The Bronx Health Collective (a Federally Qualified Health Center in the Montefiore Health System and the flagship site of the Children's Health Fund). The EHRC aims to meet the increasing need for medical evaluations of immigrants seeking asylum in the US. Participating students will assist in the completion of forensic medical evaluations by taking detailed notes and drafting medical affidavits under the direct supervision of licensed clinicians. Additionally, students will lead the clinic by maintaining clinic operations and partnerships, expanding the volunteer base, and propelling future clinic development.

Arts and Integrative Medicine Program at Montefiore Child Outpatient Psychiatric Department

AIM delivers collaborative, compassionate, community health care programming that is equity-focused, traumaresponsive, and arts-infused. The AIM program at Montefiore integrates evidence-based practices with community-informed theories and practices to meaningfully engage with and amplify the voices of young patients, health care workers and families in the Bronx. Einstein students will engage in a narrative medicine service-learning project involving AIM participants, the community, and at least one of the following arts initiatives: songwriting, spoken-word poetry, dance, filmmaking, fine arts, heritage arts, gardening, and/or photography.

Human Development Services of Westchester (HDSW)

HDSW is a social service organization providing quality behavioral health, rehabilitative, health, residential, and community stabilization services in Westchester County. HDSW is dedicated to empowering the individuals and families we serve to achieve self-sufficiency. Einstein students will work with the various programs to create unique projects, from group classes to individualized work with clients.

Kings Harbor Multicare Center

The Kings Harbor Multicare Center provides long-term and short-term skilled nursing care for more than 700 residents. Einstein students will establish longitudinal relationships with select nursing home residents that they will continue to nurture over the period of their time spent here. In addition, they will be administering periodic cognitive and depression screening under the guidance of licensed Social Workers in the facility during their visits. The students will also be volunteering and assisting in seasonal and regular recreational activities organized by the facility, e.g. Halloween parade, wheelchair decorating contest, bingo, cooking classes, etc. as per their schedule.
